

INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

Editor-in-Chief

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Manuscript Submission

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Electronic figures

Electronic versions of your figures must be supplied. For vector graphics, EPS is the preferred format. For bitmapped graphics, TIFF is the preferred format. The following resolutions are optimal: line figures – 600–1200 dpi; photographs – 300 dpi; screen dumps – leave as is. Colour figures can be submitted in the RGB colour system. Font-related problems can be avoided by using standard fonts such as Times Roman, Courier and Helvetica.



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Please double-space all material, including notes and references. Quotations of more than 40 words should be set off clearly, either by indenting the left-hand margin or by using a smaller typeface. Use double quotation marks for direct quotations and single quotation marks for quotations within quotations and for words or phrases used in a special sense.

Number the pages consecutively with the first page containing:

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Please provide a short abstract of 100 to 250 words. The abstract should not contain any undefined abbreviations or unspecified references and should set forth the basic ideas and the primary results obtained. The abstract should be readable to a broad range of scientists and not only to specialists in the subject of the paper.

KEY WORDS

Please provide up to 5 key words or short phrases which describe the areas discussed in the paper.

INTRODUCTION

The introduction should be brief and state the purpose of the work and its significance for the fields of Celestial Mechanics and Dynamical Astronomy, within the limits of what is necessary, usual or reasonable. It should not only present the problem under study and the main conclusions, but also the specific problems it can be used to solve or investigate and the outstanding issues it opens.

SYMBOLS AND UNITS

Equations and symbols should be type-written and clarity is essential. Unusual symbols should be identified in the margin, Care should be taken to distinguish between the letter O and zero; the letter I and the number *one*; kappa and the letter k; mu and the letter U; nu and the letter V and eta and the letter N. Please note also subscripts should be clearly noted and easily distinguished.

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Section headings should be numbered (e.g., 1., 1.1, 1.1.1, 2., 2.1, etc.).

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Supplementary material should be collected in an Appendix and placed before the Notes and Reference sections.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Acknowledgements of people, grants, funds, etc. should be placed in a separate section before the References.

REFERENCES

References to books, journal articles, articles in collections and conference or workshop proceedings, and technical reports should be listed at the end of the article in alphabetical order. Articles in preparation or articles submitted for publication, unpublished observations, personal communications, etc. should not be included in the reference list but should only be mentioned in the article text (e.g., T. Moore, personal communication).

References to articles in an edited collection should include the author's name; year of publication; article title; editor's name; title of collection; first and last page numbers; publisher; place of publication, in the order given in the example below.
